CEOSPEAK

It's all about PEOPLE, PROCESSES & CULTURE – capitalizing on the opportunity in the market place.

Look at any market performance parameter and you will see a common trend – 2018 was a year of turbulence and chaos, full of unpredictable events. Whether it was BJP's loss in 3 key Hindi speaking states - Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh and Chhattisgarh, US Fed's decision to raise interest rates and taking a hawkish stance, volatility in oil prices (rising to USD 85 and then falling back to USD 60), or the turbulence witnessed by NIFTY – nobody expected these events.

The financial services industry was impacted by this trend and some of our peer organizations saw similar instability, as we saw in our IE business. To top it all, the Financial and Governance crisis at IL&FS meant that wholesale lending activities pretty much shut down for a few months, effectively resulting in panic and severe correction on NBFC pricing, and stock market performance. Amidst all this, we should feel proud and happy on Ambit's performance in the same period.

We acquired an SME lending business to strengthen our presence in lending, and reduce our over dependence on the equity markets. Despite the subsequent correction in valuations and to some extent the attractiveness of this business, we continue to believe that NBFCs have an important role to play in the growth of the economy and that well managed, appropriately leveraged, well governed NBFCs like Ambit Finvest have a very bright future. Our acquisition was well-timed and well-priced and I am very confident that our experienced team will create immense value for all its stakeholders, including many of our colleagues.

During the current year, we restructured our CF leadership and created three clusters led by our three Managing Directors. In addition, Ausang Shukla was given the responsibility by the group to represent CF in the Executive Committee. This restructuring along with the implementation of a new strategic plan has helped CF to win some outstanding mandates and for the first time in many years, this group will be significantly ahead of its budget by the time we complete the financial year.

Our IE team has been the most affected by some of the recent events and changes. I want to thank our colleagues in the business and in particular Nitin Bhasin and Raman Jauhar for having led the team most effectively in difficult circumstances. With the addition of Dhiraj Agarwal as Head of Sales and several new initiatives, we hope to complete our recruitment plan by March 31st 2019. We have budgeted for the consequent impact on our revenues for this business segment for the next 6-9 months, but I want to assure you

that I am personally committed to recruit the best resources and provide necessary comfort to our clients on our desire to build a strong and independent franchise.

I want to thank Sushant Bhansali and Sid Rastogi along with other members of our PW and AM business to continue to deliver on our business plan and not allow some of the aforesaid challenges to impact our clients or the morale of our people.

The market place continues to offer an outstanding opportunity to each of our business segments. The key question is — what have we learnt from our past mistakes and how do we capitalize on this opportunity to achieve our vision of being a "Premier Investment Bank".

We must continue to recruit and retain the best talent available in the industry. In particular, our retention strategy needs a fresh perspective. We have taken several initiatives to address this subject. As you may be aware, we have just completed an assignment with AON Hewitt (AON) to determine Ambit's compensation position vis-à-vis our industry peers. AON has also initiated an exercise to help determine a transparent mechanism for bonus payments. We have now appointed Universal Consulting to establish a set of KPIs aligned to Ambit's new strategic plan. The fresh set of KPIs will be announced in the first quarter of 2019 and will help in a more transparent evaluation and promotion of people. Our people are the most important resource and we must do everything to make sure that they feel relevant and important to our organization.

The second big target for the new calendar year will be to review and strengthen processes relevant to our people in the organization to achieve Institutionalization of Ambit. Our HR team has already completed a long list of processes, which are important for our people. Other Enterprise Functions have begun a similar exercise related to each of their functions. Eventually it will be upon the leadership team, led by me, to pledge its commitment to this process. Hopefully, at the end of this exercise (by June 2019), there will be less and less discretion and need for intervention by the leadership team.

Last but not least, we must inculcate a culture that defines Ambit, which binds our people and different businesses together as ONE AMBIT. Once we achieve this, Ambit will be fully equipped to take advantage of the market opportunity, achieve its vision and deliver successfully on its commitment to all its stakeholders.

Photography Workshop:

I have been using a camera since my childhood. In those days, I used to have a Kodak KB10 camera. It was a basic point and shoot camera with no sophisticated settings that are found in latest cameras and it soon became obsolete post the launch of SLR/ DSLR cameras. Though I upgraded my KB10 to Nikon D5600, I wasn't able to update myself on the plethora of complicated settings found in a DSLR. Like most of the amateur photographers, I had seldom used it in any mode other than the Auto mode (so stupid of me!). Thanks to Ambit and Sagar Gosavi, the photography workshop was a game changer for me, not only did I learn about advanced techniques, I was also able to improve my photography skills using those various techniques.

He enlightened us not only on the advanced settings and techniques but also on the basic physics of the camera – explaining how a beam of light striking the sensor, gets converted into a beautiful picture. One of the key learnings for me was that photography is less about camera and settings and more about imagining and composing. It's not about the camera but who's behind the camera. As someone has rightly said, the most important equipment to capture a photo is not the camera but the eyes capturing them. Photography is all about capturing the moment on a piece of paper. It is neither an art nor a science, for me it's both. If you can imagine, you can compose. As David Alan Harvey had rightly said - Don't shoot what it looks like. Shoot what it feels like. And today, post the workshop, when someone asks me what equipment I used for the picture – I tell them it was my eyes.

To conclude, remember what Elliott Erwitt had said "The whole point of taking pictures is so that you don't have to explain things with words." Happy shooting!!



Met this adorable horse on our way back from Damme.







Social, Lower Parel: **Crispy Chicken Chaat,** Vada Pao Bao





Ever heard of a Pani Puri that does not have out of the puris. Definitely a must-try if you like both Pani Puri and Pizza.



Adventurous Trip To Goa -Dudhsagar Waterfalls

A place to visit again and again...

I went to Dudhsagar waterfalls in December 2018 with my wife and friends. We had heard about milk waterfall in Goa by the name of **Dudh Sagar** and by hearing the name we were very curious to visit the place. It was a four day road trip to Goa from Mumbai. After finishing our three days we began our journey in the morning at 6.30 am from Calangute and reached Dudhsagar Waterfall Gate at 9.15 am. From there we took a forest jeep for a bumpy ride of 11.5 kms which took us to the waterfalls which comes into jurisdiction of the Goa Forest Departments as it is a part of the Bhagwan Mahavir Wildlife Sanctuary and from there – it's a walk for 800 meters to see the beautiful milky white water fall.

Located on the border of Karnataka and Goa states, one can go by road or rail to Kulem railway station and then trek to the waterfall or hire a jeep with a driver to get closer in; however, there will still be a walk to reach the base of the falls.


Dudhsagar falls is a good day-trip destination in North Goa. The parks authority charges a small fee for taking a stills or movie camera on site. On arrival at the bottom of the falls, a short (but uneven) walk from the jeep park, the spectacle is fabulous. The water cascades down the rocks and into a plunge pool at the bottom. There are comical monkeys here which will pester for nibbles but are not a nuisance. Other natural attractions include a variety of birds. If you choose to take a swim in the old water of the


rockpool, be sure to take a swimsuit and towel. The jeep gives you 90 minutes or so to enjoy the falls and then head back to the park entrance. It is a fairly long way from the centres of Calangute and Panjim but worth the trip for the spectacle and a day away from the



Genesis

I was 17 when I started trading the markets, Nikhil, my younger brother, also got influenced and started when he was really young. I had traded actively for over a decade and wanted to take a break from trading knowing that Nik will do more being a better trader.

Zerodha was born with the idea of being a brokerage firm that active traders like us needed. A simple trading platform with no bells and whistles, with no advisory, that would remain transparent and offer low costs. We started with NSE trading platform (NOW) which was given by NSE for free, and a flat fee of Rs 20/trade when the rest of the markets was charging between 0.25 to 1% per trade - saving over 90% in brokerage costs.

Growth

Three years into the business and after 40,000 clients the first competitor entered the scene and said the same things - low cost, transparent, etc. It was evident that only a superior product can keep us ahead. Luckily for us, in 2013, I had convinced Kailash (K) who heads our tech to join us, which was a turning point from a brokerage to a financial technology business. K had come back from the UK after his PhD and was starting up along with his friends which I was supposed to bankroll. The idea was ahead of its time and didn't get regulatory approval, which was a blessing in disguise.

In 2015, we launched our flagship web/mobile trading platform, 'Kite'. A platform radically different with its minimal design and easy to use interface. We dropped brokerage to zero in December 2015 for equity investing in our quest to increase our target audience from the 300K to 500K active F&O traders to around 7 million people who invest. This combined with the launch of Kite kicked in virality for the first time for our business. We were at 70K clients in December 2015, we are at 1.1 million clients today - all acquired without spending any money on marketing/SEO/SEM.

What makes Zerodha stand out

Products built with a lot of love and effort - unlike what most people think, it isn't just the low cost that attracts people. It is better products.

With time we realized that the markets are extremely shallow in India, the people who have an intent to invest or learn is quite less. The real problem to solve was user experience problem - niche platforms that can appeal to the masses. There wasn't a need to build another execution platform, and Rainmatter was born. We exposed API's to everything we have built as a business and invited startups to build user experience over us. We also write cheques between \$250k to \$500k to help get the business





rolling and most importantly showcase the product to our client base of over 1 million customers to quickly help validate the product idea.

Help growing the ecosystem by educating through Varsity and by partnering startups building niche user experiences through Rainmatter.

Challenge

Challenges have been different kinds over the years. When I was trading, I was told to get a real job. So extreme pressure from the society to quit and do something else. I blew up a couple of times when trading, so had to work in a call centre and did odd jobs for almost 4 years to fund my trading. Putting together money for starting Zerodha was quite tough, essentially an all in trade. Convincing clients that brokerage business works at such low costs took us almost 5 years. Social media has been a boon, but it turns into a bane at the smallest issue. Today, extremely shallow retail participation in the Indian capital markets is the biggest challenge. Also, regulations have ensured that there haven't been any big scams in India, but they also tend to stifle innovation.

Future plans
